Pope Francis' October Prayer Intention:

For a Church open to everyone—We pray for the Church; ever faithful to, and courageous in preaching the Gospel, may the Church be a community of solidarity, fraternity and welcome, always living in an atmosphere of synodality.

From today's Reading

Sir 35:12-14.16-19/ 2 Tim 4:6-8.16-18/ Luke 18:9-14

Today's readings continue the theme of prayer. In a society where money and power are everything, the 'little people' don't have a chance. The First Reading states that God treats all people fairly. He shows no partiality to the rich and powerful. He listens to the humble prayer of the just and the lowly.

The parable of the Pharisee and the tax-collector makes the same point even more forcefully. The proud Pharisee is relying on his good works. Because of these he thinks that God owes him salvation. The tax-collector has nothing to rely on. He knows he is a sinner. So, he throws himself on the mercy of God. His words are few, but the attitude of his heart makes him pleasing to God. His humble prayer wins him forgiveness.

The parable was aimed at those who prided themselves on being virtuous and despised everyone else. Although he was boastful, the Pharisee was not a hypocrite. His problem was that he had no concept of his need of God or grace or forgiveness.

Did you know... Treaty 4 also gave newcomers many freedoms not allowed in the countries of their birth, such as freedom to own land, to worship without persecution, to become self-sufficient, to protest without fear of retaliation, to make a good living off the land and resources, etc. This remains true for newcomers to Canada today. First Nation had all these freedoms prior to the arrival of the newcomers, however, many of these freedoms were taken away after Treaty 4 was made and the Indian Act of 1876 was imposed on Indigenous peoples. Their lands were taken away which led to the inability to make a sustainable living. The land was to be shared, not taken away.

Is the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* a "universal Catechism"? Yes, because it is to be used as the reference point for all local catechisms throughout the Universal Church. In an earlier draft, the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* was titled the *Catechism of the Universal Church*, but never used. Local catechisms are created according to the needs of a specific culture, age, spiritual life, social and ecclesial conditions. The current *Catechism of the Catholic Church* was given by Saint John Paul II on the 30th anniversary of Vatican II on October 11th, 1992 and 2022 marked the 60th anniversary.
